Asked about one of his more challenging assignments, Martin harkens back to the time Okeanos was asked to design an arresting display case for eyewear at the Jacob Javits Convention Center in New York. "We had a whole desertscape terrarium thing all worked up that we thought was pretty cool", he explains, "But the last minute addition of a bunch of live boa constrictors turned out to be the talk of the town."

And who knows where Okeanos will go next. The green pool business sits firmly on their horizon with investors continuing discussions with Martin and his partner and a travel option, that will imerse clients in a real world exploration of exotic seascapes including the Great Barrier reef, first class airfare, 5 star hotels and your own custom aquarium thrown in begin at just \$75,000 – but that aquarium souvenir just can't be beat. It's a whole lot cooler than buying the kids a Hawaiian snow-dome at the airport.

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n the classical era Okeanos was the name used to describe the world-ocean, which the ancient Romans and Greeks believed was an enormous river encircling the world. From his mom buying him a 10 gallon tank to his first 55 gallon, purchased with profits from his winter snow-shoveling business, Martin has pursued a life with the fishes and with that has come the sunken treasures of marrying state-of-the-art architecture with a unique chemical-free filtration system that allows natural bacteria to filter the water, creating startling underwater seascapes that sparkle in above sea level locations.

Visiting his grandmother's fish farm in Jerusalem as a teenager, he saw first hand a simple natural filtration system that kept the water as clean as one might find in a mountain stream and has adapted that for indoor use in Okeano's recent installation of a carp pond for the lobby of 45 Broadway in Manhattan's financial district. He is currently designing the system for use in swimming pools, thus eliminating chlorine and harmful chemicals from the aquasphere and providing a viable green pool solution for sustainable recreation.

And sure, everyone with a 5 million dollar home gets a pricey chandelier almost thrown in for free but an aquatic environment that doubles as a room dividing wall proves not only to be a statement of style, but a statement that lives and breathes and swims with the home's inhabitants every day.
