FOR MARTIN SCHAPIRA, watching a school of tropical blue tangs rhythmically scuttling through the ocean's currents is like listening to a perfectly executed concerto. "It has an overwhelming effect on the senses," he says. "It's like watching an orchestra perform, but with color and movement rather than sound. It transports you completely to another world."

Re-creating such otherworldly experiences is a specialty of Okeanos Aquascaping, a New York-based builder of custom ponds and aquariums. Since founding the company in 2002, Schapira and his business partner, Nathan Kamelhar, have developed some of the world's most imaginative underwater ecosystems. Earlier this year, for example, Okeanos created a series of misty, anemone-filled tanks representing emotions such as love or melancholy, for French artist Pierre Huyghe's exhibit at the Marian Goodman Gallery in Manhattan."I love watching fish, whether it's while snorkeling and diving or going to an aquarium," Schapira says. "But sitting on a sofa at home watching a fish tank misses the point. It has to be an interactive experience."

To that end, the experts at Okeanos will create a magical underwater world in one Robb Report reader's backyard that will provide a face-to-face marine-life

experience like no other. This gift will comprise a 30-foot-by-60-foot freshwater swimming pool with a depth of up to 10 feet, which will share two walls, made from commercial-aquarium-grade acrylic, with a 50,000-gallon saltwater aquarium. With a depth of 25 feet, the L-shaped aquarium will run from the bottom of the swimming pool to 15 feet above its surface. Two of the aquarium's aboveground facades will merge with the interior of the home, resulting in both indoor and outdoor viewing areas. The aquarium will be Okeanos' largest, and the pool will be the first undertaking of its kind by the company's new division, Okeanos Swim.

Integral to the design-and a key component of Okeanos Swim's creations—is the chemical-free water used in the pool, which Okeanos achieves by combining proprietary handmade filtration and water-flow

systems. This innovative method results in water that is free from harmful bacteria and organic matter, such as algae, without the use of chlorine or other chemicals."You won't get itchy eyes or irritated skin," Schapira says. "In fact, this water is so clean and clear, you could drink it." Best of all, the water's purity allows swimmers to view the aquarium's inhabitants without the use of goggles.

The Okeanos team will customize each component of the gift, which will require at least five months to complete, tailoring the layout and design of the pool, aquarium, and surrounding landscape and furnishings to the client's preferences. The most engaging part of the

process, though, will be the careful selection of the aquarium's marine life, something that Schapira likens to layering paint on a canvas. The sizable volume of the aquarium provides

countless options for marine life, ranging up to 5-foot black-tip reef sharks. "But you don't want everything just right there in plain sight," explains Schapira."Along with the sharks and triggerfish and angelfish, you may want a few moray eels peeking out from time to time to create an everchanging picture. You want to be surprised and inspired, and in an aquarium this large, the opportunities for that kind of dynamic experience are virtually endless." —JACKIE CARADONIO
